## Hauptmann Will Undergo Mental Test

New York, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Several psychiatrists, and not three as originally announced, will conduct mental tests of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, indicted as an extortioner in the Lindbergh kidnaping case. District Attorney Samuel J. Elwell announced today. At the same time, the short affidavit on which Hauptmann was held prior to his indictment, was dismissed by Magistrate William Klapp in West Farms court today. Hauptmann was not brought into court for the routine proceedings, which required only about half a minute.

## BELIEVE FIEND YET IN DETROIT

### Search For Slayer of Child Continues

Detroit, Oct. 1.—(AP)—An unemployed musician who lived for three weeks with Mr. and Mrs. Merton W. Goodrich said today he was convinced the trap drummer in whose apartment 11-year-old Lillian Gallaher's body was found last Wednesday, still was in the city.

The pianist, Francis Collister, who said Goodrich had promised him a job that did not materialize, expressed only respect and sympathy for Mrs. Goodrich, but said Goodrich was "thoroughly bad." He said that Mrs. Goodrich often prayed for her husband and that her affection for him "was a mania."

Police spent the week end in raiding known dives, believing the fugitive was in hiding here, and in questioning scores of persons taken in those raids, but professed to have turned up not a single tangible clue to the whereabouts of the couple.

Collister said that Goodrich "was bound to get in trouble with girls" and that "he made his wife worry by chasing after the girls in beer gardens where he looked for work."

Collister said he saw the couple last Thursday in an old automobile but that they eluded him.

## CABINET OUT IN RUMANIA

### Resignation Accepted By King Carol

Bucharest, Rumania, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The cabinet of Premier George Tataru, which went into office last January, resigned suddenly today.

Differences between members of the cabinet caused the premier to submit the resignations of the entire ministry to King Carol, who accepted them. At the same time the king entrusted Tataru with the formation of a new government.

## Against Kink Owner

A suit for \$2,000 damages against H. M. Pittman, owner and operator of a skating rink near Conway, was dismissed today by Sidney Johnson, plaintiff, by Johnson's attorneys, Russell C. Roberts and Lonzo A. Ross. The case was settled satisfactorily to both parties, Mr. Roberts said. Johnson had brought suit as the result of injuries he claimed he sustained in a fall at the rink several weeks ago.

## MAN BOUND, CAR AND GIRL TAKEN

### Four Suspects Held By New York Police

Sidney, N. Y., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Four men were questioned today by state police investigating a hold-up in which a Middleburg man was bound, his car stolen and his 17-year-old girl companion taken away from him last night. The girl was released unharmed today.

Capt. Daniel E. Fox of troop C expressed the belief the hold-up was an attempt to steal an automobile and not a kidnaping.

Captain Fox said the four men were Conrad Schiedwaster, aged 23, a CCC worker; Carl, his brother, aged 18; George Watson, aged 17, and Thomas Nephew, aged 18. All are from Batavia. No charges have been placed against them, he said. They were taken into custody at Waverly, near the Pennsylvania state line, early today, and brought to the state police barracks here.

The girl, Gertrude Bender of Middleburg, drove into Oneonta early today after police had conducted an all-night search in response to a statewide teletype alarm.

## RUSSELLVILLE MAN IS KILLED

### Weaver Cowan Shoots Self Accidentally

Russellville, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Weaver Cowan, aged 41, constable of Illinois township the past four years and recently renominated for another term, accidentally shot himself fatally as he started to work today. The shotgun, loaded with buckshot, discharged as he was getting into his car, striking him in the abdomen and he died en route to a hospital.

He was once well known in the south as a professional baseball player.

## FATALLY BY SON

### W. E. Mizzell Killed Near Brinkley

Brinkley, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Ray Mizzell of Hunter, Ark., 15 miles north of here, was arrested last night and held for the fatal stabbing of his father, W. E. Mizzell, aged 65.

Officers said the stabbing occurred during an argument in an automobile in which the Mizzells and two friends were riding from Hunter to Zent. The elder Mizzell died of knife wounds in the abdomen, before the car reached the latter town.

Zent police took the son into custody there and today removed him to Clarendon for a hearing Wednesday.

## CAMP HALSEY MEN MOVE IN

### CCC Group Arrives From Camp Victor

Moving here in army trucks and those of the Faulkner county soil erosion service, approximately 200 members of the civilian conservation corps arrived Sunday from Camp Victor, Pope county, Ark., and entered their new location, Camp Halsey, near Centerville, 20 miles northeast of Conway. Seventeen new enrollees arrived this afternoon and entered the company, bringing it virtually up to its full strength of 225 men.

All of the men in the corps will be utilized in soil erosion prevention work, under the general supervision of Fred C. Newport, director of the big soil erosion project in Faulkner, White and Cleburne counties.

Arch J. Troxell, until recently county ERA director, was appointed superintendent of Camp Halsey and has already entered upon his duties.

Officers of the company who accompanied the corps here from Camp Victor are Capt. T. T. King, First Lieut. C. B. Proctor, who is also medical officer, Second Lieut. B. E. Ryan and Educational Adviser Aubrey Southard. Mr. Southard is an Arkansas State Teachers College graduate.

Fourteen camp houses have been completed for the unit, which is the only one in the state to be engaged in soil erosion prevention work, the other CCC enrollees being principally engaged in forestry and road building. Officers said the men would spend this week in putting their camp in order and completing some unfinished items in the construction and would be sent into the field for soil erosion work beginning next Monday.

The camp is located only about one mile distant from the 400-acre recreational area and artificial lake now under construction by soil erosion forces at Woolly Hollow.

Russellville, Ark., Oct. 1.—(Special)—A 19-year-old youth confessed at the county jail here last night. Sheriff J. Leonard Bell announced, to the slaying September 30 of his 30-year-old wife aboard a freight train in Poinsett county and dropping her body beneath the wheels of the moving train to be mangled almost beyond recognition.

The young husband, Thildie Vance of Hollow Bend bottom, 15 miles southeast of here, was arrested there last night. Almost immediately after his arrival at the county jail the young husband signed a written statement in which he admitted the slaying, Sheriff Bell said.

Poinsett county officers were notified immediately, and they were expected to arrive today to return the young man to Harrisburg, the county seat of Poinsett county.

Sheriff Bell said Vance told him that he struck his wife twice over the head with an iron rod when also threatened to leap from the moving train because "he had told her he would not live with her any longer. He said he became enraged at his wife when he allegedly learned she had been keeping company with another man.

Ascertaining that the two blows on the head had killed her, Vance said he dropped the body between the freight cars.

Upon reaching the next stop on the railroad, Vance said he alighted and immediately boarded another train bound in the direction from which he had come. The engine crew on the second train discovered the mangled body and halted the train. He said he alighted and viewed the body, continuing on the train when it proceeded again.

The couple boarded the train at Stuttgart. Vance said they were on their way to St. Louis, Mo.

Vance said he went to the home of his father, Early Vance of Humphreys, Ark., where he remained for several days before returning to his home here.

Mrs. Vance's home was at Pottsville, five miles east of here. The couple married a year ago at Russellville. Mrs. Vance was married previously to a man named Mason.

Deputy Sheriff C. T. Sullivan of Poinsett county came here Saturday in search of Vance, but he was not found until Sheriff Bell, Deputy Sheriff Burl Harris and Jailer J. E. Bonds went to Hollow Bend bottom.

## First National Bank Deposits Show Gain
