Plans call for opening three new camps, the re-establishment of two and the closing of six camps, giving the state one less than was operated during the winter.

The Little Rock CCC district will begin enrolling approximately 2,600 youths to replace enrollees being dis-charged this week at the expiration of their enrollment period in Arkan-
