Commencement Programs Are Announced by Col. H. L. McAlister, President

Programs for the exercises marking the close of the thirty-first annual session of the Arkansas State Teachers College were completed today, Col. H. L. McAlister, president, announced.

The baccalaureate service will be held next Sunday night at 8 o'clock, when the commencement sermon will be delivered by Rev. C. E. Newton, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Pine Bluff.

The commencement exercises will occur on the following Monday morning at 10 o'clock, when the baccalaureate address will be delivered by Chief Justice Griffin Smith of the Arkansas supreme court and degrees will be conferred by President McAlister.

Final examinations for the session will be held Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week.

The summer term will be opened on Wednesday, May 31.

Harry Mashburn Third Victim of Auto-Truck Collision Near N. L. R.

Little Rock, May 17. (AP)—Harry Mashburn, 20, of England, died this afternoon in a local hospital of injuries received Saturday in an automobile accident in which two other persons were killed.

Richard Elder, 38, and Miss Helen Ruth Acrec, 18, both of England, were the other victims when their car plunged into the rear of a heavily loaded lumber truck just outside of North Little Rock.

Still Hopeful CCC Camp Halsey Will Be Again Occupied

Citizens of the Centerville community and adjacent area are still hopeful that Camp Halsey will again be occupied as a civilian conservation corps camp. Dr. H. B. Hardy, leading citizen of the community, said here today. Some encouragement was taken from the fact that orders for demolition of the buildings had twice been postponed, May 2 and 15. Lease on the camp grounds expired May 2, Dr. Hardy said, but A. F. Halsey, owner of the land, has signified willingness to renew the lease for a nominal sum.

Reestablishment of the camp, according to Dr. Hardy, will depend upon its acceptance by the soil conservation service, as this is believed the only activity that would provide sufficient work for the enrollees.

TRAIN HERE

Exhibition Special To Make One-Hour Stop At Conway May 27

An opportunity to inspect one of the finest steam passenger trains ever assembled will be given residents of Conway at 6:10 p. m. Saturday, May 27, when a Missouri Pacific lines exhibition special pulls into the local yards for a one-hour stop in the course of a 2,800-mile tour of the west and southwest.

The exhibition special is being operated to stimulate interest in railroading and to direct attention to improvements which have taken place in passenger train equipment in recent years, according to B. C. Benedict, local agent of the Missouri Pacific, who said that the railroad is particularly interested in receiving as many school children as possible aboard the train.

"We realize that the school children of today are the train passengers of tomorrow," said Mr. Benedict. "A great many of them have not had the opportunity of seeing for themselves what a modern railroad has to offer in the way of comfort, speed, economy and safety. We believe that a visit to the exhibition special will give them a better insight into modern railroading than could any amount of classroom study."

He added that adults are extended an equally cordial invitation to inspect the train.

Air-conditioned throughout, the train will be made up of a locomotive, baggage car, a grill coach, a deluxe coach, a diner-lounge and a Pullman car, and will be representative in every respect of many of the railroad's daily trains.

Aboard the train will be representatives of such Missouri Pacific departments as passenger traffic, freight traffic, operating, air-conditioning, publicity-advertising, Pullman, diner car and lounge car, for the purpose of explaining various phases of railroad operation to persons inspecting the train.

CARL BACKMAN UNREPORTED ON OCEAN FLIGHT

New York, May 17. (AP)—Carl Backman, Swedish aviator attempting a transatlantic flight from Newfoundland to Stockholm, Sweden, was unreported at an early hour this afternoon.

ADDITIONAL MINERS WILL RESUME WORK

Hazard County Operators Sign Union Shop Contract With United Workers.

Harlan, Ky., May 17. (AP)—The Hazard county coal operators employing approximately 7,000 men today signed a union shop contract at Lexington with the united mine workers, as 400 additional national guard troops were ordered in readiness to move into this strife-torn coal area. Sam Caddy, president of the Hazard district, UMW, said he was writing an order for the miners to "start work immediately" and added that some may be in the pits before the end of the day.

Signing of this agreement, the same as 15 other operating groups approved in New York last Saturday, left only the Harlan operators in Kentucky dissenting from the union shop contract.

The Hazard operators issued a statement saying that while they "still opposed the union shop" it would be economic suicide not to sign.

Brig. Gen. Elmer Carter, in command of the state troops ordered here by Gov. A. B. Chandler as mines closed since March 31, opened said the 400 more soldiers had not been called to duty, but "alerted" for possible quick movement. There are at least 800 soldiers here.
